

I Can Know Snow Information Post Curriculum Summary

Introducing the Theme:

Interactive Group Discussion Activity

Preparation/Materials: Flip Chart, Marker

Procedure: Ask: “What do you know about Snow?” (“What Do You Want to Know About Snow?”)

Children raise their hands to share their thoughts. Write the word or sentence and name of the person that shared. No right or wrong answers. This brainstorming is so much fun and gives you insight into what the children know or want to know about the subject.

Procedure: Options. T/F/ Vocal Quiz. Card Game Recall, or students copies for Written Worksheets.

Card Game Preparation: Cut 2"x2" sets of squares in red and green colors. Write Letter T or True on the Green. Write Letter F or False on the Red. Each child gets a set. Make the T/F statements as a 'read-a-loud' to the group. The children respond by holding up the appropriate answer card. Make no corrections here. Give the correct answer. The children will adjust their cards. Save for other T/F.

B. Reading Comprehension. Reading for Humor. Snowman Jokes.

- Goal: Children will enjoy understanding what is funny about a joke.

Preparation/Materials. Print out Teacher copy. Copies for students.

- Goal: Children will use a list of words to write a story or a poem.

Preparation/Materials: Copies of D-1, Build a Story/Poem Worksheet.

Procedure: Independent Creative Writing Activity.

E. Art

E-1 Draw a Snowman Freehand. Paper, pencil/crayon. Chalk on black/blue paper.

E-2 Draw 6-sided 'Asterisk' Snowflakes. Black or dark blue construction paper, Chalk. Make different sizes of letter 'X'. Draw a line through the middle for the 'asterisk'. Fill in areas with chalk dots.

E-3a Snowperson. Color Snowperson.

E-3b Snowperson Jacket. Color, Cut, and Glue Jacket on Snowperson.

E-4 Trace Hands for Mittens/Gloves. Children trace around their hands and color. See E-4 Sample.

E-5 Snowflake Picture. Free Art Color Sheet. Copies of Color Picture.

E-6 Igloo Epsom Salts Painting. Copies of Igloo picture with Epsom Salts Painting recipe (see last page).

Preparation and Materials: Copies of the Hexagon shape.

Procedure: Children Color, Cut, and Glue on a color sheet.

G. Section #4 Kids That Live in Snow Social Studies/Cultures Lesson

G-1 Group Activity Discussion and Print Modeling

Preparation/Materials: Teacher Copy of Section #4, Flip Chart, Marker.

Procedure: Read the #4 Section. Write the Inuit Words on the Chart and meaning.

Children repeat the phonics of the Inuit word. Leave chart displayed in the room.

H. Section #5 Each Snowflake is Different Social Awareness/Vocational Lesson

H-1 Group Activity Discussion and Print Modeling

Preparation/Materials: Teacher copy of Section #5, Flip Chart, Marker

Procedure: Read the #5 Section. Write the vocational list on the Chart. Read each choice on the list. Ask children to vote on which vocation they want to be. Write the number beside the vocation. Leave the chart displayed in the classroom.

I Can Know About Snow

You look out the window. It is a Saturday, no-school morning. It is a very cold and wet day. You can not go out and play.

Boring.

But, what are those funny, white things falling down from the sky? First, just a few are falling down. Now, many are falling down fast. The trees are white. Daddy's blue car is white. The grass is white. The whole world is white!

It is snowing!

Mom bundles you up like a 'mummy'. You run out and make a snowman with your friends!

What Makes a Snowflake?

A snowflake is not frozen rain. Frozen rain is sleet. To know about snow, you have to know about water.

Water is the only substance of earth that can turn into three different forms.

1. Water can be solid (ice).
2. Water can be liquid (glass of water).
3. Water can be a gas called 'vapor' (clouds).

Snow is made when tiny droplets of water vapor in the clouds freeze before falling down like rain.

When the air is 32 degrees or lower, the vapor droplets freeze around a tiny piece of dirt in the air.

This makes an ice *crystal*.

The ice crystals stick together. They branch out like tree limbs. They form snowflakes in patterns of different shapes and sizes. It takes about 200 crystals to make one snowflake.

When they get heavy, they fall from the cloud. They fall through the air down to the ground so you and your friends can make a snowman!

Did You Know?

- It takes about 5 million (5,000,000) snowflakes to make a small snowman
- A snowflake has 6 sides
- A shape with 6 sides is called a *hexagon*

Snow "Kids"

The *Inuits* (Eskimos) live in the Arctic regions of the North Pole. Like you, they live in warm homes and watch television. But they still build ice igloos for shelter when hunting.

The Inuits have many different words for snow. Check them out!

- wiliwip - "snowballs that are made for fun!"
- kiliwip - "snowballs made for a weapon for protection"
- kripiqup - "a form of snow in the shape of an animal"
- nap'pap - "snow seen in a dream"
- cak'blok - "snow frozen around 'caribou' (reindeer) poop"
- Ba'qamutik - "the best snow for dog sled races!"
- blab' gob - "snow shoved in the mouth of a person who talks too much!"
- blip'aput - "snow that is less than one foot deep"
- ganik - "snow in the air"
- aput - "snow on the ground"

Wouldn't it be fun to have an Inuit friend?
