Fleece - The full coat of fur removed from an animal.


“Si” - Yes.

“**Viva la Bolivia**” - “Long live Bolivia.”



Did You Know?


- Vicunas and Guanacos are wild in South America
- Vicunas are in the Camel family with Llamas and Alpacas (and Guanacos)
- Vicunas are the national animal of Peru in South America
- Vicuna wool is the most expensive of all animal wools
- Vicunas were 'endangered' in 1974 (only a few thousand left. They were 'hunted' and destroyed for their wool)
- Vicunas have recovered: now number 350,000
- Vicuna's long teeth are constantly growing
- Vicunas live at high altitudes of 10,000 to 16,000 feet
- Vicunas are shy but very alert and watchful
- Vicunas are 5 feet long, 3 feet tall at the shoulder and weigh 150 pounds
- Vicunas are sheared only when their fur has grown for three years
